Orlando Carnival



The Orlando Carnival takes place every year over Memorial Day Weekend in Orlando, Florida. This year it will take place May 27-May 31. The Orlando Carnival has been a tradition for the past 32 years and celebrates and promotes a deeper understanding and appreciation of the Caribbean Culture. The Caribbean Culture is represented at the carnival with displays of dance, music, masquerades, costumes, and cuisine. Orlando Carnival is a family friendly event and hosts over 20,000 people. Many different Caribbean counties and islands are represented at the carnival including Trinidad, Tobago, Guyana, St. Vincent, St. Lucia, Barbados, Virgin Islands, Dominican Republic, Belize, Cuba, St. Kitts, Bahamas, and Grenada. Malcolm X Day:

Malcolm X is celebrated every year in May, on either the 19th (his birthday) or the third Friday of the month. This year, Malcolm X Day is on Friday, May 21, 2021. A prominent leader during the civil rights movement, Malcolm X initially joined the Nation of Islam in the mid-1940. Born Malcolm Little, he changed his name to Malcolm X to commemorate his new religion and beliefs and to symbolize his stolen African identity. In the early 1950's, Malcolm X became a minister of the Nation of Islam in Harlem, NY, where he advocated self-defense and the liberation of African Americans "by any means necessary". As he began to publicly speak and preach about the racial inequalities and separation in America, he started to develop a more outspoken philosophy than that of Elijah Muhammad (leader of the Nation of Islam) and slowly separated from those teachings, mostly because he did not feel they sufficiently supported the civil rights movement. He formally left the organization in 1964. Malcolm X was a passionate and eloquent public speaker and leader and was admired by the African American community around the county. He founded the Organization of Afro-American Unity, which encouraged African Americans to look at and embrace their African heritage and to move from civil rights to human rights.
